
You will know more of these accomplishments as you scan the pages of this newsletter which we are able to revive after two years of dormancy.

FPA gears for 'Agency-wide' ISO Certification

"We will not stop with just one office under FPA to be ISO Certified. We shall aim that FPA will be ISO 9001: 2015 certified covering all of its mandate."

Executive Director Wilfredo Roldan emphasized this during the celebration of the FPA 42nd Anniversary on May 30. FPA currently holds an ISO Certification 9001: 2015 on the 'provision of licenses, registrations, and permits on fertilizer,' achieved through the efforts of the Fertilizer Regulations Division (FRD).

With the present undertaking, the agency created the Quality Management System Committee (QMSC), which shall ensure that all requirements are aligned with the ISO 9001: 2015 Standards.

ISO 9001: 2015 is the latest version of the ISO 9001 standard which is widely-known and internationally accepted for quality management. ISO acknowledges organizations that can establish a quality

management system and commit their continual improvement. The composition of the QMSC included teams for planning, document management, risk management, training and advocacy, knowledge management, quality workplace, internal audit, and internal assessment.

ISO Orientation and Process Walkthrough

On 7 May 2019, QMSC members underwent ISO Orientation and Process Walkthrough with speakers from the Development Academy of the Philippines (DAP). The activity focused on the introduction and

discussion of the latter's principles, requirements, and processes.

The DAP advised that FPA will now be targetting the 'Development of a Quality Management System Certifiable to ISO 9001:2015 Standard for Fertilizer and Pesticide Authority.' It underscores the scope of an 'Integrated ISO QMS Certification' for FPA which will require the involvement both of its frontline and support offices. DAP said that offices in FPA at all levels must review their internal processes and harmonize it with the organizational structure, mandate, and overarching quality policy.





The Development Academy of the Philippines (DAP) challenges FPA to pursue its application for ISO 9001: 2015, and to document and streamline its organizational processes.

ISO Documentation and Process Requirements Workshop

The training was succeeded by a Workshop on ISO Documentation and Process Requirements on 15-17 May 2019 at the Bureau of Plant Industry, San Andres St., Malate, Manila. It enabled the participants to draft ISO 9001: 2015 QMS Required Documented Information and a draft list of Externally Provided Products, Processes, and Services. FPA joined participants from the Bureau of Plant Industry (BPI) and the Bureau of Agricultural and Fisheries Engineering (BAFE).

Training on Risk-based Quality Planning

On June 13-14, a workshop on Process Mapping and Risk-based Quality Planning was conducted at the 4th Floor Training room FPA Building. As a result, FPA was able to identify relevant issues, risks and opportunities the organization shall address through risk-based quality planning, devise a QMS process map, and come up with a revised/updated Quality Policy and Quality Objectives.

Workshop on QMS Documentation

To enable FPA to come up a clear framework of the organizational operations, a workshop on QMS Documentation was conducted on June 25-27, 2019 at the 4th Floor Training Room FPA Building.

To put into a document said framework, FPA was able to draft its Quality Manual which presents all the relevant and interdependent processes within the organization.

The following Offices/Committee was tasked to determine specific organizational process:

- Agency profile, organizational structure, scope, and coverage- QMS Secretariat
- Management Process- OED
- Core Operations- FRD and PRD
- Support Process- FAD, LSD, and PMID
- List of interested parties' requirements and risk opportunity registry and action plan- QMS Risk Management Team
- Control of External Providers FRD, PRD, FAD, LSD, and PMID
- Reference Matrix OED
- Improvement Plan PMID

On February 26-27, 2019, the Laboratory Services Division (LSD) underwent an initial assessment for its application for ISO/IEC 17025:2005 Accreditation.

ISO/IEC 17025:2005 is the ISO standard that accredits laboratories that can demonstrate operational competence and generate valid results, thereby promoting confidence in their work both locally and internationally.

The Philippine Accreditation Bureau (PAB) of the Department of Trade and Industry (DTI), composed of technical assessors and experts, reviewed and assessed the documentation and implementation of the Agency's laboratory as against the requirements of ISO/IEC 17025:2005.

Actual demonstration of laboratory analyses and interviews had been facilitated to determine the technical competence of each laboratory personnel.

The Assessment Team advised LSD to comply with the results of their on-site findings within six (6) months from the date of the initial assessment.

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FPA holds dialogue with pesticide stakeholders, MoA Labelling Guidance on pesticides pushed

FPA accommodated the request of CropLife Asia and the Crop Protection Association of the Philippines (CPAP) to hold a dialogue with pesticide industry stakeholders to deliberate matters and developments relevant to their sector.

On February 20 at the FPA Auditorium, the stakeholders raised their call to integrate the Mode of Action (MoA) Labelling Guidance by Croplife International in the Product Stewardship Program of pesticide industries.

Croplife said that the MoA Labelling Guidance is responsive to the need to avoid the development of pest resistance due to farmer's repetitive application of pesticides with the same MoA. MoA refers to the way pesticide works given their type, chemical ingredient and level of toxicity.

"The inclusion of MoA labelling in product labels would make it easy for the dealers and farmers to be guided in diversifying the pesticides they will use. MoA labels allows them to identify the type of pesticide they are buying- if its Herbicide, Insecticide and Fungicide, and their level of toxicity indicated through assigned coding or numeric group," explained Croplife.

The guidance suggests that the inclusion of MoA information on product labels, supported by training and other resources, is critical to ensure growers have the information they need to follow resistance management guidelines.

It further said that MoA labelling has been already adopted by few

countries in their regulations, but it is foreseen that more countries will make it mandatory in the future.

Accordingly, it considers the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) and World Health Organization (WHO) Guidelines on Good Labelling Practice for Pesticides.

Taking into account the positivity of the proposition, Executive Director Wilfredo Roldan said that FPA will prepare the necessary guidelines and integrate it in the Greenbook. He advised industry stakeholders to take the lead in promoting such action, for the meantime.

Other agenda discussed included updates on the revision of the Greenbook, actions on the call to transfer household pesticide regulation to FPA, and clarifications in some of the provisions of the PIP guidelines.

Revision of Greenbook

During the meeting, Engr. Jacqueline Romualdez, OIC of the Pesticide Regulations Division (PRD), shared that they are still working on revising some of the provisions of the Greenbook.

She said that they are yet to finalize the number of third party authorizations for registering products with the same active ingredient and formulation. They are also working on improving the statements under 5.5.3.C (Recording System for Stored Pesticides) to make these sound as being 'seriously imposed.'

In relation to the MoA Labelling Guidance, she suggested that the label must be placed in the front panel preferably on the upper right corner.

Finally, she advised industry stakeholders to provide position papers to properly facilitate the thorough revision of the Greenbook.

Transfer of household pesticide regulation

Dir. Roldan said that he will consult Atty. Brillantes on the possibility of drafting an Executive Order reiterating that pesticides, either household or agricultural, should be under the regulation of FPA, as stipulated by PD 1144.

It has to be taken note that the regulation of household pesticides was transferred to the Foods and Drugs Administration (FDA) after the Supreme Court's decision in 2007 stating that household pesticides are not under the regulation of FPA.

Enhancement of PIP Guidelines

Concerns raised relative to the FPA Memorandum Circular No. 10 series of 2017, otherwise known as the "Guidelines for the Registration of Plant-Incorporated Protectants (PIPs) in Pest-Protected Plants (PPPs) and other Agricultural Pesticidal substances derived from modern biotechnology" became the final agenda of the dialogue.

The stakeholders mentioned that registration of stacked products is not covered by the said guideline, and they suggested for its integration in the Greenbook.

Jerolet Sahagun, Chief of the Laboratory Services Division (LSD)

explained that stacked products containing PIPs are already covered by said order, highlighting that its scope is regardless of the brand or nature of product.

Dir. Roldan said that FPA will take note of the recommendations by stakeholders, and assured that there will be no complications if said guidelines will be added in the Greenbook, and FPA will continue working on improving it.

The conduct of capacity-building through public-private partnership to increase number of accredited researchers and evaluators, and enhance skills of FPA laboratory personnel for PIP regulation has also been tackled. //

FPA sets 2019 direction through annual planning workshop

As an annual activity to set commitments based on proposed budgets for the new calendar year, FPA conducted its Annual Planning Workshop at Los Banos, Laguna.

The workshop commenced through presentation and discussion of the Field Unit's IPCR and DPCR by the Field Operations and Coordination Unit (FOCU) headed by Suzettie Alcaide on February 6.

Among the concerns deliberated included the FUs' target on monitoring of dealers and f/p products, reporting of violations and issuance of Stop Use, Stop Move and Stop Sale (SUMS).

On February 7 during the opening ceremony of the activity, FPA

Executive Director Wilfredo Roldan directed the CO and FUs to hasten the delivery of public services, and anchor their thrust to the FPA's four pillars.

He advised the Fertilizer Regulations Division (FRD) and the Pesticide Regulations Division (PRD) to fast-track the revision of the Bluebook and Greenbook.

Afterwhich, Deputy Executive Director for Pesticide Eric Divinagracia reiterated the importance of budget allocation to fuel the operations of the agency.

He also imparted the value of the principle 'going back to basics' (B2B) like reviewing the Agency's mandate, knowing ones' job description, familiarizing the provisions of the Bluebook and Greenbook and others. "Doing these simple yet meaningful activities would help the Agency to move forward," he said.

2019 budget

On the presentation of FPA 2019 budget, Alma Apduhan, Budget Officer, shared that FPA's budget for 2019 is PhP 213.7M which is 60% higher than the budget in 2018.

The increase is attributed to the following approved budget allocations: Magna Carta benefits for S&T workers (laboratory personnel), capability program of FPA employees as part of the Learning and Development Program, operating expenses for the attainment of ISO 9001: 2015 certification, replacement of office equipment, upgrading of ICT equipment, and the construction of the six story building for the FPA laboratory.

Prior to the presentation of budget proposals and targets by FPA offices, Apduhan discussed the guidelines in preparing the FY 2020 Budget proposal.

Dialogue with FPA Director

In the interest of openness and accountability, a dialogue with FPA's Executive Director Wilfredo Roldan concluded the planning workshop activity.

During the session, the following concerns were taken into consideration: the creation of FPA counterpart office in ARMM;

utilization of approved 2020 budget if it could be disbursed within the time-frame; follow-up on the request for lot area from DA by FU IV with the documents submitted already; and, the coordination with the LGU for the opening a landfill for the disposal of used f/p containers by FU VIII.

Warehouse visit

On February 8, the participants had a field exposure at the Cyberth Philippines Inc. and BAYER Cropscience Inc. The activity aimed to enable the participants gain new knowledge from the companies' product stewardship programs, and their best practices in f/p product research and development.

Cyberth Philippines Inc. is a private-owned company engaged in the trading of crop protection



chemicals having 30 registered products with FPA.

On the other hand, the BAYER CropScience Inc. is one of the core businesses of Bayer Inc. focusing on the development of innovative technologies to help farmers and promote sustainable agriculture.

FPA strategy map 2019-2022 finalized



FPA has finally released its strategy map 2019-2022, a framework which presents the strategies of the agency in fulfilling its four strategic thrusts-- fertilizer and pesticide regulation, education and product stewardship, harmonization with international standards and good governance.

The latter also serves as a standalone tool that would easily communicate the general structure, the systematic management processes of the organization, and the measuring parameters.

On February 4, members of the Management Committee (ManCom) and Assistant Division Chiefs convened to discuss and see to it that the map is in compliance with the Citizen's Charter and the Ease on Doing Business Act.

The FPA Strategy Map 2019-2020 was also presented during the Annual Planning for comments by the Regional Officers.

Five associations sign MOU with FPA for conduct of training programs for ARCO, CPA and Researchers





Members of training associations and some FPA employees witnessed the MOA signing between FPA and training association leader representatives.

Five associations signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with FPA for the conduct of education, training and motivation programs for agricultural pesticide applicators (CPA), Responsible Care Officers (ARCO) and Researchers, on April 16.

The Philippine Association of Certified Pesticide Applicators (PACPA), PMCP Foundation Inc., the Philippine Association of Entomologists, Inc. (PAE), and the Philippine Association of Professional Fumigators, Inc.(PAPFI) renewed their contract. In addition to the list, a new partner training association, the Kapisanan ng mga Pest Control Operators sa Pilipinas,

Inc. (KAPESCOPI), was welcomed by FPA.

The MOU delineates the shared responsibility for training management between the two interested parties.

FPA will provide application forms to the applicants; monitor the proceedings of the training course; administer the examination for Certification/Accreditation, and provide the basic training requirements in the form of guidelines and parameters for the training course.

On the other hand, the training associations have the responsibility to provide supervision and management over the training course; provide resource persons as required in the program;

evaluate the applicants using the eligibility criteria set forth by the FPA; provide the needed materials, manuals and supplies, including certificates and other paraphernalia needs in the training program; and, collect reasonable fees to defray the cost of food, material, resource speakers, management, etc.

Further, they should evaluate the participants' training performance based on the criteria set forth by FPA; and submit to FPA a training report which shall include the following: program, resource speakers, the result of the evaluation of participants' training performance and financial report a week after the training has been conducted.

The training associations have been tapped given their technical and management capabilities to conduct training and symposium. They should be willing to assist and provide FPA with the necessary training support services in its accreditation activities.

It has to be taken note that only applicants who have attended the required training courses shall be allowed to take the FPA accreditation examinations.

"Go beyond your purpose of doing business by serving the public and the agricultural sector. Your business must have more meaning," advised Executive Director Wilfredo Roldan during the MOU Program Signing.

FPA exec participates in Geneva Basel Convention, condemns entry of domestic hazardous wastes to PH





FPA Executive Director Wilfredo Roldan and a representative from the Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR) represented the Philippines during the BC COP-14.

FPA Executive Director Wilfredo Roldan attended the 14th meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Basel Convention (BC COP-14), the ninth meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Rotterdam Convention (RC COP-9) and the ninth meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Stockholm Convention (SC COP-9) in Geneva, Switzerland on April 29- May 10, 2019.

The theme of the meetings is "Clean Planet, Healthy People: Sound Management of Chemicals and Waste". The meetings included joint sessions covering matters of relevance to at least two conventions and separate sessions of the meetings of each of the three COPs.

The conference discussed issues concerning the control of environmental pollutants like microplastics, waste materials,

and among others. In addition to the Convention's Toolkit on Environmentally Sound Management (ESM) of Wastes, member-countries agreed to develop technical guidelines on e-wastes as well as persistent organic pollutants wastes, burning on land and specifically-engineered landfills.

Specifically, Dir. Roldan presented the country's stand on the inclusion of Carbosulfan for severely hazardous pesticide under Annex III of the Basel Convention. This would mean that the pesticide chemical needs to undergo prior informed consent procedure in international trade.

Banning of domestic wastes

On April 24, FPA forwarded its expression of support to the Ratification of the Ban Amendment on the Basel Convention to the Department of Foreign Affairs-Office of United Nations and International Organizations (DFA-OUNIO).

The said amendment is an Indonesian-Swiss Initiative which aims to improve the effectiveness of the Basel Convention. It proposes the movement prohibiting developed countries from transporting their garbage or hazardous wastes to developing countries like the Philippines.

FPA recommends that hazardous wastes coming from fertilizer and pesticide (f/p) products should be covered in the proposed amendments of the Basel Convention since these are detrimental to human health and the environment.

Dir. Roldan said that this is a part of the actions in promoting proper waste disposal of used f/p containers and products by industry stakeholders.



Online platform for promotion of GAD in FPA launched

To provide a portal for sharing information on mainstreaming gender and development within the Agency, members of the FPA Gender and **Development Committee** spearheaded the launching of the online GAD Corner on May 30, 2019 at the FPA Function Hall. Executive Director Wilfredo Roldan and **Acting Deputy Director for** Fertilizer Antonio Cruz led the unveiling ceremony.

The online platform or the Focal Point System (GFPS) features FPA's collection of GAD knowledge materials and its related programs, projects, and activities.

Its establishment complies with Executive Order No. 273, directing

all government agencies to institutionalize a mechanism of ensuring the full implementation of the policies, strategies, programs and projects outlined in the Philippine Plan for Gender-Responsive Development. It also is in consonance with Joint Memorandum Circular No. 2013-01 approving the Implementing Rules and Regulations on the Localization of the Magna Carta of Women.

Accordingly, the online platform will enable the public to be familiar with the efforts of FPA in advancing gender awareness within the agency. It will also serve as a knowledge exchange center where best practices and experiences on gender-related advocacies and programs can be shown to reinforce public consciousness towards gender equity.

Four FPA technical employees attend ATI's extension delivery training course

To address the need to capacitate extension personnel to support more efficient and effective delivery of agricultural services to the grassroots, the Agricultural Training Institute (ATI) conducted a series of training on extension delivery system for extension service providers from attached agencies and bureaus of the Department of Agriculture (DA).

Four FPA employees attended the training course namely Jonsie Baysa, Information Officer II (PMID), Edward Calapatia, Agriculturist II (FOCU), Ivan Layag, Information Officer III (PMID), and Wilbert Newton Pollisco, Senior Agriculturist (FOCU).

The training aimed to equip the participants with working knowledge, skills, and attitude to become effective extension service providers especially in adapting to change, overcoming resistance, and adopting innovations.

The enabling objectives included discussion of the basics of Agricultural Extension (AE); description of the clients of extension; explanation of the different approaches, strategies, and methods; and, demonstration of the effective communication skills in extension. Ultimately, this training aimed for the participants to apply the different concepts of AE in their respective workplaces.

The training, which was delivered through a combination of lecture/discussions, group exercises, and plenary sessions, covered the modules on Basics of Agricultural Extension, Agricultural Extension Approaches, Methods, and Strategies, and Communication in Extension.

Dr. Rowena D.T. Baconguis, a professor from the UP Los Banos-College of Agriculture (UPLB-CA) and Ms. Antonieta J. Arceo, Chief of the ATI Information Services Division (ATI-ISD), served as resource persons.

"Though the application of AE is indirectly related to the function of FPA as a regulatory agency, the learnings acquired with this training will be most applicable with the daily interactions and provision of services of the participants with their stakeholders," said the FPA participants.

Further, they said that FPA has an integral role in making these differences and solutions to FPA's main stakeholders – the farmers, with the Agency's continued Information, Education and Communication (IEC) Campaign, and capacitation through conduct of different trainings and symposia on the safe and judicious use of agricultural inputs on a national level.

The participants recommended that the training be reechoed to the FPA Regional Field Units (RFUs) with their regular IEC campaigns/extension work. A more innovative version of the training, that would fit the needs of RFUs and FPA as a regulatory agency, should be conducted with which ATI is willing to provide resource speakers. Additionally, the RFUs should be capacitated on training management for the efficient delivery of FPA's mandates.//

FPA IV observes residue analysis through simulation spraying

To determine the amount of pesticides acquired in the body of local farmers whenever spraying of pesticide is being done in the field, FMC corporation conducted the first of its kind residue analysis thru simulation spraying on January 23. The said activity was done in their research station in Sta. Maria, Laguna thru the services of chemists from Eurofins Agrosciences Services.

The sampling was collected in different parts of the cloth to establish which part of the body absorbs the most pesticide during spraying and will be kept in a secured packaging during transport to Hamburg, Germany for Laboratory Analysis.
